
PUBLIC ART VISIONING + PLANNING

The Public Art Reimagining Tour with You (P.A.R.T.Y.) is a planning process organized by Chicago's Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events (DCASE) to support Public Art Vision Plans for INVEST South/ West neighborhoods as part of the City's Five-Year Capital Plan.

Funding is **committed** by the City for Public Art Projects **implementation**. ~\$1 Million per neighborhood

P.A.R.T.Y. will result in public art Requests for Proposals (RFP) that are:

- Aligned with CDOT Streetscape Projects
- Building on existing cultural assets
- Informed by themes & cultural narratives identified through artist-led community engagement
















Race and Ethnicity

West Humboldt park is predominantly a Black community, compared to Humboldt Park as a whole being predominantly a Latinx community




Mortgage as Percent of Income








Through a series of activities, we asked questions related to challenges and opportunities along the corridor.












Comparison of total dots and comments on the board








WHAT WE HEARD - PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

Participants were asked about imagery that resonated with them. 42% of dots/comments were specific to gateway and public art.












DESIGN THEMES

Participants were asked about imagery that resonated with them. Of the total dots/comments for this activity 38% were for 'Celebrating Art & Culture.'









CORRIDOR CONCEPT ALTERNATIVES

- Safety concerns. Chicago Avenue is a high crash corridor.
- Current layout in condusive to the "Double Threat"
- Important transit corridor, but bus lanes are not functioning as such
- Chicago Avenue is identified as a safe route for cyclists










- Designated turning lane accommodates pedestrian islands to increase pedestrian safety at crosswalks
- Designated turning lane decreases vehicular accidents
- Protected bike lanes provide separation safety for cyclists and pedestrians
- Parking on north side of street only accommodates bike and middle turn lanes













- Two-lane traffic reduces crossing distance, increasing pedestrian safety
- Two-lane traffic elimates the potential of 'double-threat' pedestrian accidents
- Two-lane travel accommodates parking on both sides of street
- Protected bike lanes provide separation safety for cyclists and pedestrians













DESIGN STRATEGY AND BENEFITS



BUS BULB WITH RAISED BIKE LANE

Description:

- Curb extension that aligns a bus stop with the parking lane.
- Help buses move faster and more reliably by decreasing the amount of time lost when merging in and out of traffic.
- Raised Bike Lane: Located at the level of the adjacent sidewalk, vertically separated from motor vehicle traffic.



CURB EXTENSION

Description:

- Located at the mouth of an intersection.
- Installed at the entrance to a residential or low speed street.
- Intended to mark the transition to a slower speed street.
- Creates a gathering space.



PROTECTED BIKE LANE

Description:


 Located adjacent to sidewalk curb with a concrete buffer between the bike lane and the travel lane or parking lane.







DESIGN STRATEGY AND BENEFITS



REFUGE ISLAND

Description:


• A median with a refuge area that is intended to help protect pedestrians who are crossing a multi-lane road.



RAISED CROSSWALK

Description:

- A ramped speed tables spanning the entire width of the roadway.
- Acts as a traffic-calming measure that allows the pedestrians and cyclists to cross at grade with the sidewalk.



MIXING ZONE

- An area where dedicated bike facilities approach an intersection with vehicular turn lanes.
- Ensures visibility and clarity at the point where cyclists and vehicles must cross paths or share the roadway and to position the cyclist so as to avoid conflicts with turning vehicles.







COMMUNITY IDENTIFIER CONCEPTS

The history, culture, and vision of the West Humboldt Park community are created by the people.

- The curvilinear lines represent the flow of time, the past continuing to grow, cultures becoming more dynamic, and the tenacity to persevere through difficulties.
- The human figures represent the importance of individual support to build a community. The members of the community build our history and drive the vision of hope, diversity, and unity.
















CONCEPT B: THE FLOWER OF CHICAGO

Celebration of culture and economic development along the corridor, remembering the vibrancy of the past and looking toward a corridor that celebrates existing restaurants, community organizations and businesses, while reinvigorating the cultural activity that is and once was.

- Central Figure: Cultural celebration and movement through the corridor and looking east towards the city.
- Flowers: Homage to enjoying Chicago Avenue and its businesses. The official flower of Chicago is the Chrysanthemum, which often symbolizes joy.














The pattern of colors represent the diversity of a neighborhood block. The free-flowing and interweaving lines represent the bond and connection that form a community. The pattern created using the module represents multiple blocks coming together to create a neighborhood, both in 2 and 3 dimensions.

- Form: The free-flowing lines connect the blocks, the neighborhood, and the city together.
- The patchwork symbolizes the strength of the whole when the individuals are bonded together.
